We are a small biologist-managed facility, with a focus on wildlife ecology research and post-secondary education. However, we believe strongly that ecological conservation can only happen with community involvement, and thus we also provide a wide range of community programs to members of our community and involve locals in all aspects of our research and education initiatives.

Local post-secondary students are also offered biology internship opportunities free of charge.

Over the years, we have also collected a large number of science textbooks and reading material for kids, youth, and adults from the neighboring villages to borrow from our library.

We also host an annual event at the T.R.E.E.S Research Center called Environmental Day where local children spend the day learning about and becoming immersed in the different research projects we are doing which greatly increases their enthusiasm for their environment.

Plans are in the works to develop a week long summer camp at T.R.E.E.S in 2019, replete with wildlife research activities, sustainable agriculture lessons, art and music classes, and sporting events. Summary

Here at T.R.E.E.S we implement a farm to table concept so guests can see where their food comes from and know it was grown organically and sustainably. We also practice many permaculture principles, which encourage wildlife to have access to some of our crops as well. Our property was originally a lime orchard and now has over 50 species of different fruit trees and a thriving vegetable garden, planted amongst the fruit trees which provide much needed shade in a hot climate. We also have a substantial aviary of freerange laying hens, meat chickens, and ducks that are fed a combination of kitchen scraps, soldier fly larvae, other insects, and limited commercial feed; we hope to soon feed them our own grains and corn that we are growing. Our vision is to become an organic agriculture demonstration center, hosting workshops for local farmers to learn agricultural practices that protect the surrounding mountains from harmful "slash and burn" agriculture.
